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CIF DISBURSEMENT REPORT



CLIMATE INVESTMENT FUNDS

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1 Introduction

- 1. This semi-annual report provides an update as of December 31, 2021, on the disbursements by the Climate Investment Funds (CIF), namely the Clean Technology Fund (CTF) and the Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) comprising the Forest Investment Program (FIP), the Pilot Program for Climate Resilience (PPCR), and the Scaling-up Renewable Energy Program in Low-income Countries (SREP). The report was prepared by the CIF Administrative Unit in collaboration with the multilateral development banks (MDBs). Further analyses on the projects and pipeline tracking are presented in the operational and results report for the CTF program and the respective risk reports.
- 2. In this report, "disbursement" refers to the CIF funds transferred by MDBs to recipient countries or private sector implementing entities. The disbursed funds tracked in this report include funds (loans, grants, and equity participations) for investment projects and project preparation grants (PPG). MDB project implementation and supervision (MPIS) fees are not included as part of the disbursements. Guarantees are considered 100 percent disbursed, once the guarantee product becomes effective and can be drawn by beneficiaries, regardless of the actual transfer of funds.
- 3. The report begins with a review of disbursements at the aggregate CIF level and narrows down to CTF and SCF in Section 3 and Section 4, respectively. Each SCF program is analyzed separately in Sections 5, 6, and 7. Disbursements in public sector projects per program are presented in the Annexes. Disbursement data from private sector projects and programs are included in overall country or program disbursement tables and figures, but not in the Annexes with project/program-level data, due to the confidential nature of the projects.

2 Overall CIF portfolio disbursements

- 4. As of December 31, 2021, CIF's cumulative disbursements amount to USD 4.2 billion representing 58 percent of the USD 7.2 billion in funds approved by the MDBs for projects. CIF's total MDB-approved funds increased marginally from USD 7.1 billion in June 2021.
- 5. For the period under review (July 1, 2020–December 31, 2021, the first semester of fiscal year 2022, FY22)², CIF's overall disbursements increased by USD 121 million compared to the increase of USD 136 million recorded in the comparative period of FY21. The decline is attributed to a project funded by a guarantee,³ which was canceled during the semester under review. Table 1 shows a summary of CIF's portfolio of MDB-approved funds and the cumulative disbursements by CTF and SCF, as of end of the first semester of FY22. Figure 1 shows the trend in CIF's disbursement ratios since FY11.





Figure 2: Average age of CIF programs (MDB's approval date to December 31, 2021)

6. CIF has been in existence since 2008. In 2009, the MDBs approved the first cohort of projects amounting to USD 100 million in CTF funding. By 2012, an equivalent of USD 1.8 billion in projects had been MDB-approved under CTF. In the case of SREP, the first MDB-approved project was in 2011. Figure 2 shows the average age of projects in CIF programs' portfolios. They range from an average of 4.1 years for SREP to 7.4 years for PPCR, with an envelope of projects largely approved. Project age is measured from the MDB approval date to December 31, 2021. The portfolio average is the weighted average of each project's age in the portfolio (weighted by the MDB-approved funding). Therefore, with a portfolio average age of 5.7 years, CIF has disbursed, in aggregate, 58 percent of the MDB-approved funds. SCF and CTF have disbursed 67 percent and 55 percent of the funds, respectively (see Figure 2).

Cumulative MDB approvals

2.1 CIF's disbursements by region

- 7. Projects in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region represent approximately 10 percent of the aggregate CIF portfolio. As of December 31, 2021, CTF projects have a combined disbursement ratio of 91 percent Four of the top six projects (by MDB-approved funds) are fully disbursed, including the Ouarzazate concentrated solar power (CSP) project with USD 440 million fully disbursed.


Figure 3: Share of disbursements in CIF's MDB-approved funding per region⁴ (as of December 31, 2021)

- 8. CIF's projects in the Europe and Central Asia (ECA) region are in Armenia (SREP), Kazakhstan (CTF), Tajikistan (PPCR), Turkey (CTF), and Ukraine (CTF). Together, these projects have disbursed cumulatively 65 percent of total funding approved by the MDBs, as of December 31, 2021. The Asia region, which accounts for the largest share of CIF funding (approximately one-third), has disbursed 58 percent of MDB-approved funds, with one-quarter of the region's CTF and PPCR projects disbursing over 75 percent of MDB-approved funds. Figure 3 shows the distribution of CIF's disbursements across the regions.

2.2 CIF's expected disbursement profile

9. It is expected that 74 percent of the undisbursed MDB-approved funds, or approximately USD 2.3 billion, will be disbursed within the next five years. Only 11 percent of the undisbursed funds will be disbursed beyond the five-year time frame. The disbursement profile is based on the MDBs' best estimates of their disbursement schedules and informed by the current information on projects in their portfolios. Figure 4 shows the expected trajectory of the disbursements of outstanding MDB-approved funds.

2.3 Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on disbursements






Figure 5: Annual disbursements per program

10. Headwinds from the COVID-19 pandemic remain, but the ensuing bottlenecks and disruptions from the shock have significantly receded. Most countries have begun to remove the mobility restrictions that were put in place at the height of the pandemic, but the impact of the pandemic on CIF programs' annual disbursement levels has been uneven. Disbursements from CTF declined significantly relative to SCF programs, as shown in Figure 5.

- 11. The variation in the impact of the pandemic on annual disbursements of CIF programs is largely attributable to the differences in the nature, scope, and scale of projects across programs. FIP and PPCR projects entail field activities that provide more flexibility. This was essential during the pandemic as it enabled a more adaptative management and implementation approach to navigate the constraints imposed by COVID-19. Further, materials and inputs for FIP and PPCR projects are often available locally in implementing countries. This similarity explains the strong historical correlation between annual disbursements from FIP and PPCR (see Figure 6a).
- 12. The variation in the intensity and timing of social distancing measures in CIF countries also contributed significantly to observed disparities in disbursements across programs. The level of shock was not uniform across CIF countries. SCF programs have a relatively larger overlap of countries: 36 percent of FIP countries are also PPCR countries and 28 percent of SREP countries are also PPCR countries (see Figure 6b). This explains the strong historical correlation in disbursements across SCF programs and their generally similar trajectory in disbursements during the pandemic.

- 13. CTF projects are relatively large in scale and scope compared to other programs and often involve relatively complex procurement procedures that often require taping into the global supply chain. CTF projects often include massive construction that requires gathering a large labor force. The pandemic resulted in restrictions at various levels that directly impacted CTF projects, leading to a significant decline in disbursements.
- 14. The decline in disbursements is expected to have bottomed in FY21 and beginning in FY22, disbursements are expected to increase, and in an extreme scenario of a COVID-19 shock, the CIF Administrative Unit expects the impact on disbursement volumes to persist for up to 24 months. After that, disbursements are expected to return to trend volumes, and may, in some programs, overshoot trend levels as more projects transition into implementation. The risks to these expectations arise from the lingering possibilities of additional COVID-19 waves, spillovers from the Ukrainian crisis, and the resurgence of other operational impediments that may affect projects in CIF's recipient countries.

3 CTF's portfolio disbursements




Figure 7: Trends in CTF's disbursement ratio

15. CTF's MDB-approved funds increased by 3.6 percent to USD 5.1 billion in the first semester of FY22. This includes the MDB approvals net of cancellations⁶ that occurred during the reporting period. Cumulative disbursements increased by USD 82 million compared to USD 50 million in the comparative period of FY21. The disbursement ratio, however, remained flat at 55 percent, as MDB approvals increased faster than disbursements. Figure 7 shows CTF's disbursement trends since FY11.

3.1 CTF's disbursements by region




Figure 8: Share of disbursements in CTF's MDB-approved funding per region (as of December 31, 2021)

16. As of December 31, 2021, projects in the MENA region, which mainly relate to the Noor Ouarzazate CSP project, have cumulatively disbursed 91 percent of the MDB-approved funds, while the ECA region cumulatively disbursed 63 percent. The ECA projects include two financial intermediary projects in Turkey with a fully disbursed sum of USD155 million. Figure 8 shows the breakdown of the cumulative disbursement by region.

17. Projects under CTF's investment plans have disbursed USD 2.6 billion as of December 31, 2021, while the projects under CTF's Dedicated Private Sector Programs (DPSP) have disbursed USD 224 million. Tables 2 and 3 show the breakdown between the investment plan and the DPSP project

disbursements by recipient country. The DPSP disbursements are still low, as the portfolio is in its infancy, compared to the investment plan portfolio.

3.2 CTF's expected disbursement profile




Figure 9: CTF's expected disbursement profile¹⁰ (as of December 31, 2021)

18. As of December 31, 2021, 55 percent of CTF's MDB-approved funds have been disbursed, while 45 percent are undisbursed. Of these undisbursed funds, it is anticipated that 91 percent will be disbursed within the next five years. Figure 9 shows the anticipated disbursement profile for the CTF funds that are MDB-approved. The disbursement profile is based on the MDBs' best estimates as reflected in their disbursement schedules. The estimates are informed by the current information on the projects in their portfolios.

4 SCF's portfolio disbursements

19. Disbursements under SCF increased by 2.4 percent from USD 1.36 billion to USD 1.39 billion in the first semester of FY22, resulting in a cumulative disbursement ratio of 67 percent of

MDB-approved funds. SCF's aggregate MDB-approved funds decreased from USD 2.11 billion to USD 2.09 billion due to cancellations in PPCR and SREP that occurred during the same period (see Table 4).

20. The SCF aggregate disbursement ratio increased from 64 percent to 67 percent in the first semester of FY22 due to sustained increases in disbursements across all programs. Figure 10 shows the trend of the disbursement ratio since FY11.

- 21. SCF's projects in the ECA region disbursed 85 percent of the funds approved by the MDBs, while projects in Africa and the Latin America and Caribbean region had disbursement ratios of 69 percent and 65 percent, respectively. Figure 11 shows the disbursement ratios by region.
- 22. Projects in ECA are mainly PPCR's projects in Tajikistan and SREP's projects in Armenia. As of December 31, 2021, more than 70 percent of the projects in Tajikistan have either fully disbursed or disbursed at least 90 percent of MDB-approved funds.

5 PPCR's portfolio disbursements

23. Disbursements in PPCR increased by 3.2 percent in the first semester of FY22, from USD 821 million to USD 847 million, and net MDB-approved funds marginally decreased to USD 979 million due to cancellations amounting to USD 26 million in the review period. As a result, PPCR's cumulative disbursement ratio increased from 82 percent to 87 percent during the reporting period. Figure 12 shows the trend in the PPCR cumulative disbursement ratio since FY11.

5.1 PPCR's disbursements by region

- As of December 31, 2021, PPCR projects in the African region had disbursed 93 percent of the MDB-approved funds. This relatively high cumulative disbursement ratio is largely attributable to the advanced maturity of the projects in the Africa region relative to projects in other regions.




Figure 13: Share of disbursements in PPCR's MDB-approved funding per region (as of December 31, 2021)

- 25. Figure 13 shows a breakdown of the share of disbursements in PPCR's MDB-approved funds by region. Disbursements in ECA are due to projects in Tajikistan.

26. Projects under PPCR's Strategic Programs for Climate Resilience (SPCRs) have cumulatively disbursed USD 836.6 million as of December 31, 2021, while PPCR's Private Sector Set Aside (PSSA) projects have disbursed USD 9.2 million. PPCR's Business Development for Resilience Program (BDRP) is still new, with disbursements only totaling USD 0.6 million. Tables 5, 6, and 7 show a breakdown of the SPCR, PPSA, and BDRP project disbursements by recipient country.

5.2 PPCR's expected disbursement profile




Figure 14: PPCR's expected disbursement profile (as of December 31, 2021)

27. As of December 31, 2021, 13 percent of MDB-approved funds are undisbursed, amounting to USD 132 million. These funds are expected to be disbursed within the next five years. Figure 14 shows the expected disbursement profile for PPCR's outstanding funds. The disbursement profile is based on MDBs' best estimates of their disbursement schedules according to the project information as of December 31, 2021.

6 SREP's portfolio disbursements

- 28. Disbursements in SREP decreased by USD 11 million from USD 199 million to USD188 million in the first semester of FY22, due cancellation of a project supported by an SREP guarantee. Disregarding the impact of the guarantee, disbursements increased by USD 15 million during the semester.




Figure 15: Trends in SREP's disbursement ratio

- 29. Due to the cancellation, MDB-approved amounts increased marginally from USD546 million to USD547 million during the semester. As a result, the disbursement ratio decreased from 36 percent to 34 percent. Figure 15 shows the trend in the cumulative disbursement ratio since FY11.

6.1 SREP's disbursements by region




Figure 16: Share of disbursements in MDB-approved funding per region (as of December 31, 2021)

30. SREP projects are relatively less advanced than other SCF programs, as reinforced by its aggregate weighted average project age of less than five years as of December 31, 2021. Cumulatively, the African and LAC regions disbursed 35 percent and 42 percent of the MDB-approved funds, respectively. Figure 16 shows a breakdown of the disbursements by region.

31. The projects under the SREP investment plans have cumulatively disbursed USD 204.5 million as of December 31, 2021, while the SREP PSSA projects have disbursed USD9.1 million. Tables 8 and 9 show a breakdown of the SREP investment plan and the PSSA project disbursements by beneficiary country.

6.2 SREP's expected disbursement profile




Figure 17: SREP's expected disbursement profile (as of December 31, 2021)

32. As of December 31, 2021, 66 percent of the MDB-approved funds are undisbursed. Of these undisbursed funds, about 95 percent are expected to be disbursed within the next five years, which will bring cumulative disbursements of the current SREP's MDB approved funds to 97 percent. Figure 17 shows the expected disbursement profile of SREP's outstanding funds. The disbursement profile is based on the MDBs' best estimates of their disbursement schedules according to the current project information.

7 FIP's portfolio disbursements





Figure 18: Trends in FIP's disbursement ratio

33. In the first semester of FY22, FIP's disbursements increased by USD 24 million from USD 331 million to USD 355 million, compared to an increase of USD 35 million in the comparative period of FY21. The cumulative disbursement ratio increased from 59 percent to 63 percent during the review period, as disbursements grew faster than MDB approvals. Figure 18 shows the trend in the cumulative disbursement ratio since FY11.

7.1 FIP's disbursements by region

34. FIP projects average five years in age, making FIP less mature than PPCR whose average project age is 7.4 years. Cumulatively, the Africa and Asia regions have disbursed 72 percent and 57 percent of the MDB-approved funds, respectively. Figure 19 shows a breakdown of the disbursements by region.

7.2 FIP's disbursements by country

35. The projects under FIP's investment plans have cumulatively disbursed USD 297 million as of December 31, 2021, while the projects under FIP's PSSA and the Dedicated Grant Mechanism for Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities (DGM) have cumulatively disbursed USD 15.0 million and USD 43.1 million, respectively. Tables 10, 11, and 12 show a breakdown of FIP's investment plan, PPSA, and DGM project disbursements by recipient country.

7.3 FIP's expected disbursement profile




Figure 20: FIP's expected disbursement profile (as of December 31, 2021)

36. As of December 31, 2021, 37 percent of FIP's MDB-approved funds have not yet been disbursed. Of these undisbursed funds, approximately 90 percent is expected to be disbursed during the next five years. This will bring the cumulative disbursements of the current FIP MDB-approved funds to 96 percent. Figure 20 shows the expected disbursement profile for FIP. The disbursement profile is based on MDBs' best estimates of their disbursement schedules according to the current project information.

8 Conclusion

- 37. The impact of the COVID-19 crisis on disbursements is expected to be transitory and to last for up to 24 months before disbursements return to their general levels. Before the pandemic, SREP projects were reaching advanced stages of implementation, triggering a phase of sustained increases in annual disbursements. Risks to these expectations arise from the lingering possibilities of additional COVID-19 waves, further vaccination delays, and the resurgence of other operational impediments that may affect projects in CIF's recipient countries.
- 38. Despite the effects of the pandemic on CIF's activities, more than 74 percent of undisbursed MDB-approved funds (or approximately USD 2.3 billion) is expected to be disbursed over the next five years. This assumes successful acceleration of ongoing efforts and sustained progress toward reopening some economies.
- 39. FIP and SREP projects have, on average, entered a critical implementation phase, and are expected to continue to progress relatively faster than other programs once the pandemic clears. Nonetheless, total disbursement volumes shall continue to be driven by CTF and PPCR, given the nature and scale of their projects.
