Simon and Vicky,

During appraisal, the Government of Mexico determined that it was able to meet a greater share of the costs of the investments from its own domestic resources and this resulted in a reduced requirement of IBRD funding, while maintaining the scope and implementation arrangements of the project. This is certainly "a cause for celebration", since it indicates the increased commitment and awareness of Mexican authorities and the private sector to the objectives of urban transport transformation .

The elements of the new situation include:

a) the decision by Mexican authorities (BANOBRAS and FONADIN) to extend the framework of the project to all investments in transport supported through their domestic programs. That is, as a result of the UTTP, all projects financed by BANOBRAS in urban transport will be reviewed through their potential to abate emissions in the sector and will be covered by the Bank's environmental and social safeguards;

b) the recent approval by the World Bank's Board of the Green Growth DPL, covering both the urban transport and energy sectors, which increases by US\$1.5 billion IBRD resources tied to developments in low carbon, at the same time expanding the availability of government resources to implement the urban transport program;

c) the interest of the private sector to participate in the introduction of advanced low-emission vehicle technologies in Mexico with their own resources; and

d) the confirmation of the substantial role of FONADIN in cofinancing the UTTP.
